7/6

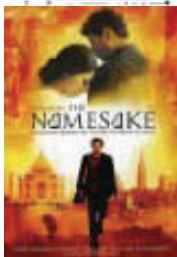

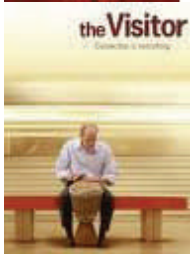

Few films have dealt more incisively or compassionately with marriage than *Days and Clouds*. In Genoa, Elsa and Michele (Margherita Buy, Antonio Albanese) suddenly find themselves financially downsized, and must deal with the horror of losing face among their yuppie friends, as well as their own daughter, hard-working restaurateur, Alice (Alba Rohrwacher).



## The Namesake

Adapted by screenwriter Sooni Taraporevala from the novel by Jhumpa Lahiri, director Mira Nair's *The Namesake* is populated by well-drawn characters and filled with memorable shots and engaging scenes. But in the larger sense, the film is a provocative look at the two sides of immigration: the adjustments faced by a couple who move here from a distant land, and the struggles of their offspring to reconcile their parents' traditional culture with their own distinctly American outlook.



## The Visitor

A deeply moving drama built around longtime character actor Richard Jenkins, *The Visitor* is a simmering drama about a college professor and recent widower, Walter Vale (Jenkins), who discovers a pair of homeless, illegal aliens living in his New York apartment. After the mix-up is resolved, Vale invites the couple--a young Syrian musician named Tarek (Haaz Sleiman) and his Senegalese girlfriend (Danai Gurira)--to stay with him. An unlikely friendship develops between the retiring, quiet Vale and the vital Tarek.
